Housing



At our April 30th Nehemiah Action, elected officials representing all four governing bodies in the Charleston region agreed to support CAJM's Housing Action Plan as a first step in establishing a Regional Housing Trust Fund with permanent funding from all local governments. The next day, the Post and Courier's lead editorial, entitled,

"Regional solutions to housing crisis needed," endorsed our goal of "dramatically increasing the supply of affordable housing units in the area."

On July 10th, CAJM hosted the first Regional Housing Coalition Meeting, including national housing trust fund expert, Michael Anderson, who gave a presentation on the benefits of establishing a regional housing trust fund.

Last week, a CAJM delegation of 20 community members met with Mayor Tecklenburg to gain his support for the Regional Housing Trust Fund. The Mayor agreed with us that the Housing Trust Fund is necessary and will only work if there is a dedicated source of funding. He also acknowledged the need for all municipalities to participate. He stated

that he is committed to supporting the Regional Housing Trust Fund. CAJM members also took that opportunity to invite Mayor Tecklenburg to our 7th annual Nehemiah Action on Monday, May 6th. He would not commit to attend that meeting.

The second Housing Coalition Meeting was held on September 5th. The work is off to a very good start. To continue to build support for this work, it will be important for us to have strong presence at all city, town, and county meetings:

submitted bids to conduct a study of racial bias in the the Charleston Police Department. Their top three firms are:

- * RTI International

These three companies will give presentations to the police audit committee on Monday, September 24 beginning at 1:00 PM in the Gaillard Center. Following the presentations, the committee will vote on one company to recommend to City Council.

Wages - Getting Our Workers Paid What They Are Due

Charleston Legal Access (CLA) is Charleston's first sliding scale law firm. They are committed to expanding our Wage Recovery Program so that workers of all income levels including undocumented workers have access to legal representation.

UPDATE! CLA has received a grant from the South Carolina Bar Foundation for a Wage Recovery Project, to start October 1, 2018. This grant funds a half-time attorney for the project!
