

Uncovering self-interests: Reflections from Rickey Dennis on the annual Justice Ministry Conference



CAJM staff and members recently attended the annual Justice Ministry Conference in Hebron, Kentucky, where organizations within the Direct Action Research and Training Center engaged in sessions that offered necessary tools for building relationships, raising investments, and tackling community issues. We also learned how to better uncover people's self-interests.

Self-interests refers to the concerns that motivates people to act. We all have self-interests based upon our personal values, such as fairness, equity, diversity, fulfilling biblical mandates. Other self-interests are survival-based, such as the desire to live in a safe neighborhood, or to make a living wage.

In one training session at the conference - I did a mock one-onone with an South Carolina Baptist pastor who asked questions about why I had entered the field of justice - I learned more about my own self-interests. I recalled the anger I first felt when I learned how Jesus had been co-opted by the institutional church in our nation to promote slavery, sexism, etc. This anger has created a self-interest that motivates me to be involved in a justice ministry that sees congregations as a tool of liberation rather than sources of oppression.

What are your self-interests? What motivates you to pursue justice? Your self interests might be based on your own religious convictions from your respective faith traditions - Judaism, Islam, Agnosticism, Atheism, etc. You probably also have self-interests that are survival based, such as the desire for people to afford a home. When we act on our self-interests, they help us live out the call of the Divine to love one another.




