



Memorial Day Reflection; thank you for making the Celebration a success

Today, we celebrate Memorial Day to recognize fallen soldiers of the U.S. Armed Forces. One of the earliest celebrations of deceased soldiers in America took place in Charleston in May of 1865, when thousands of newly-freed slaves honored the remains over 260 Union Troops at present-day Hampton Park. How unexpected it might have been for the enslaved or their oppressors to believe that African Americans would one day become free enough to publicly honor those who died to help liberate the enslaved. It is just as unlikely as the formation of our Justice Ministry - a multiracial group of individuals across faith traditions coming together to advocate for justice in the Deep South. And yet, for more than a decade, CAJM has led the charge for equity and justice in a region that has historically treated people unfairly.


