Everything CAJM wins starts in somebody's living room.

In a few weeks our congregations open their doors to speak out loud about what it takes to keep a child fed at the end of the month. Or to talk about getting pulled over for nothing. Whatever the story whatever the topic we welcome them. We take those stories, we sort them, we research them, and we put them in front of the people who can say yes.

None of that comes from a mailing list. It comes from **relationships**. One-to-one, name by name, somebody asks somebody. That is our proven practice, and it is how every leader in this work was found, not by a flyer, but by a person who already knew them and believed they had more in them.

We listen in house meetings. We bring what we hear to the Community Problems Assembly. Our congregations vote. One body, out loud, deciding together. **That is how we fight and build a community that is fair and just.**

The election coming up on November 3 is not so different. Same practice, bigger room. We look at what is in front of us and we decide together, only this time what we are deciding is who holds the seats.

Every win we have has needed somebody in office to move. County Council had to vote before the Housing Trust Fund was funded. Municipal council members have to move before the Regional Food Council is real. We name what this community needs, but somebody sitting in a seat has to act on it.

We do not endorse candidates. But this community decides who sits in those chairs, and then we hold them to what our stories demand.

So make sure you are ready to handle the business of voting, your registration, your ID, your polling place. Then make sure the people around you understand their role in this. Talk about voting with your folks. At the kitchen table, after service, on the porch.

We always say bring three for victory. That applies here too. Bring three to the polls.

Statewide Affordable Housing Legislation

When CAJM was founded in 2012, our leaders started dreaming about sister organizations across South Carolina — and we made that dream real, sending one of our organizers to Columbia to start MORE Justice, then applying for a grant that let our leaders and Lead Organizer lay the groundwork for GOAL Justice in Greenville. When we dream together, amazing things happen. Once our sister organizations were established, we began dreaming about working statewide issues together, and after two years of conversation we settled on affordable housing, since all three organizations had active housing committees. A steering committee formed in the fall of 2023 to research the problem, and what we found was eviction filings: hundreds of thousands of South Carolina families blocked from safe, affordable housing because a filing stays on their record forever. We joined partners across the state to pass a bill limiting how long those filings stay public — and this past legislative session, with our power of people, it passed. Eviction filings over seven years old now come off the public record automatically. We have always had our sights set on writing legislation together, so our statewide committee **PUSH, People United for Statewide Housing** — is now drafting a bill to get affordable housing built, because our research showed that land acquisition is one of the biggest costs and that congregations across the state want to build but run into everything from a lack of capital to zoning restrictions. With support from Transformative Organizational Consulting and the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, the draft would remove rezoning requirements for these projects; let congregations and other nonprofits keep their nonprofit status while building, with 30% of units at market rent to create mixed-income properties that generate maintenance funding; require housing at 60% AMI or below; apply Good Cause protections on evictions; and open up state housing tax credits, extending them through 2050. The bill is still in the drafting stage and we want your input — it is never too early to start talking about what it could mean for families across our state, because this is not only about safe and secure housing, it is a chance for our congregations to fulfill their missions and show landlords and legislators what it looks like to truly care for working families.

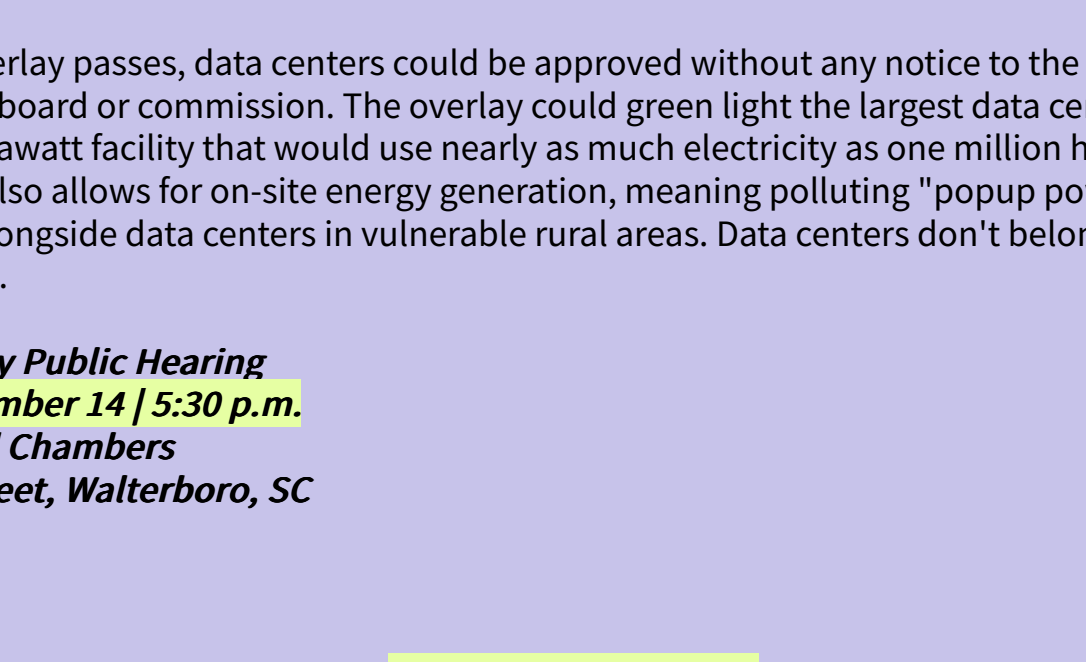

In the Community

From the Coastal Conservation League:

We need you to attend the Colleton County Public Hearing and **say NO to data centers in the ACE Basin and rural areas!**

Colleton County Council recently approved a "Digital Infrastructure Overlay" on first reading without public comment, excluding you from the conversation. This overlay would permit data centers across much of the rural county, including in the ACE Basin and in the Rural District 1 and Rural District 2 zones. We need you to tell Colleton County Council that we do not want data centers in our rural areas or the ACE Basin.

If this zoning overlay passes, data centers could be approved without any notice to the public and no public vote by a board or commission. The overlay could green light the largest data center in South Carolina, a 1 Gigawatt facility that would use nearly as much electricity as one million homes. The zoning overlay also allows for on-site energy generation, meaning polluting "pop-up power plants" could be built alongside data centers in vulnerable rural areas. Data centers don't belong in rural areas or the ACE Basin.

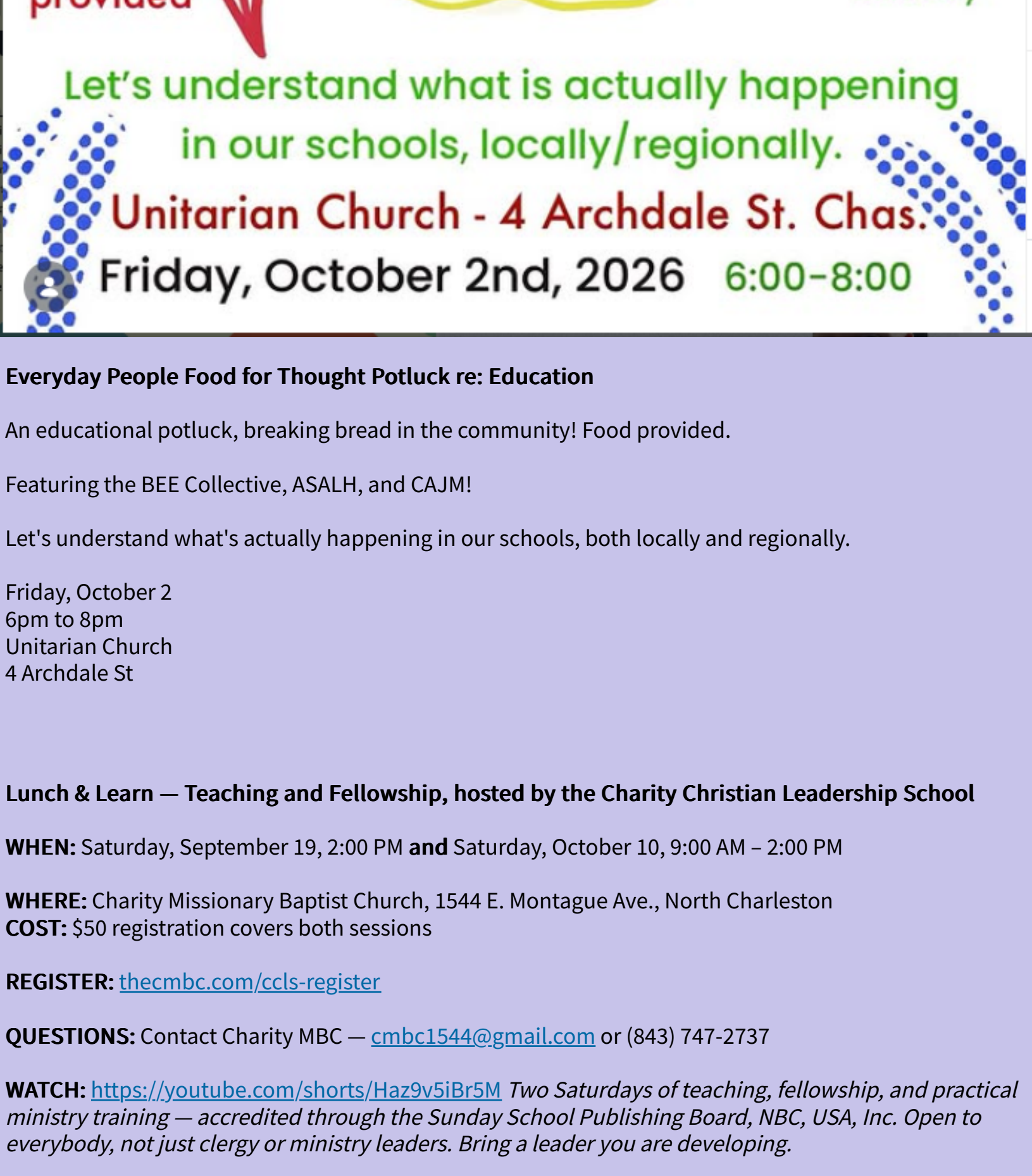
Our School Governance and Restorative Practices committees have sat across from this board for years. Here is your chance to hear from the people asking to sit on it.

Development Ordinance Project (UDO)

The City of North Charleston is preparing for growth. They are rewriting the rules that guide how the city grows, shaping not only neighborhoods, but also streets, sidewalks, and public spaces.

What is a UDO?

A Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) is a comprehensive local law that combines zoning, subdivision, and land development regulations into a single document. It establishes how land may be used and developed by defining permitted land uses, building standards, setbacks, density, parking, landscaping, signage, environmental protections, and the procedures for obtaining development approvals. A UDO provides clear, consistent rules for property owners, developers, and local officials while helping ensure that new development aligns with the community's long-term planning goals.

From the E3 Group — Citizen Leadership Institute

The E3 Group is accepting applications for the Citizen Leadership Institute, a scholarship-funded, project-based leadership academy for everyday residents. Parents, block captains, small business owners, youth mentors, faith volunteers, neighbors who refuse to accept the status quo. No political experience or degree required.

Scholars work through asset-based community mapping, reading municipal budgets and sharpening broad concerns into winnable policy asks, power mapping and one-to-one relational conversations, and finally presenting a community policy package straight to local decision-makers.

They're few years will sound familiar to you: democracy is not something that starts and stops at the ballot box every few years. When residents step back, decisions about housing, transit, and schools happen to us instead of with us.
